

Sikles Homestay Trek



Trip Overview

Sikles is a charming and excellently well-preserved village on a small hill in the lap of the Annapurna region in the Kaski district of Nepal. The village is home to Gurung, Brahmins, and Tamang people, of whom the Gurung are the majority. This village has an elevation of 1980 m.

It is renowned for some of the stunning panoramas of the Annapurna Mountain Range and the iconic Macchapuchhre Peak. Moreover, you will be able to explore snow-capped peaks such as Lamjung Himal and Annapurna II.

The village in itself is a cultural and natural hub and also a place to explore the traditional Gurung houses, terraced fields, and rich culture. Being the starting point for various treks, including the Annapurna trek, this place offers various vistas of the mighty Himalayas, diverse flora and fauna, and a vibrant culture of Gurung and Gorkhali.

The Sikles Homestay Trek is an alternative trek to Annapurna Treks and offers a wonderful experience for camping and trekking in Nepal. You will trek through high alpine meadows and towering peaks. This village has several Buddhist monasteries along with small, ravishing temples.

Sikles Home Stay Trekking is the perfect destination to explore the countryside and nature of Nepal.

- 1 - Dive to Burjuing Khola and trek to Galegaun
- 2 - Galegaun to Tara Hilltop Parche Village
- 3 - Sikles village up to Lamang Himal Glacier- overnight at Sikles
- 4 - Trek to Tanting village
- 5 - Tanting to Yanjakot
- 6 - Trek to Gale Gau
- 7 - Gale Gau to Ganpokhara
- 8 - Trek to Beshishar

- 9 - Drive back to Kathmandu
